





Landis on Hitting Spree.

UST a year ago, it seemed only Manager Al Lopez thought a thin rookie outfielder named Jim Landis ever would become a hitter for the Chicago White Sox. Now it's a new season and a new Landis, coming along at .294 at the moment with a dandy .381 average for the last month.

The kid from Fresno, Calif., hit an amazing .429 at Colorado Springs in 1956 to get his shot with the Sox last season. But he was only a .212 swinger in the American league and finished the year in the minors.

Now Landis has hit in 30 of his last 32 games, driving in 22 runs. He was 2-for-4 yesterday, lining a 2-run double that provided the clincher in the seventh and adding a 2-run single as the White Sox defeated Kansas City, 7-2.
